

He won the Jack Dyer Medal for the best and fairest player at the Club in 1977. He was not only in the Richmond Team of the Century, but he also made it into the AFL's Team of the Century. He concluded his great career with the Tigers by playing 300 senior games. This AFL season launch luncheon on Friday, 10 April is a gilt-edged ACS event. It should not be missed.

ABOUT THE BOOKS (1) LUCKY COLLINS

Bert Collins was a giant in the '20s. The papers nicknamed him 'Lucky', but Herbert Collins, a lifelong gambler, lost as many bets as he won. In 1921, Collins was Australia's captain and the most successful batsman in international cricket – within a decade, he was destitute, and living on charity, his reputation stained by allegations that he sold a vital Test match to gamblers.

Lucky is published by Ken Piesse Cricket Books and includes 192 pages plus a 16 page gloss picture section. It costs \$50.

Val Holten - A Giant of the Game.

was just a kid when my father first took me down to Mentone Oval to be coached by C.V.'Val' Holten, who was just about the best player ever to play 'Subbies' cricket here in Melbourne.

It was the summer of '68. Val was in his 40s and a mentor to many far superior players than me, but the time and



effort he'd spend for an hour each Sunday morning with me was immense. He'd start bowling seam up and slow down to gentle offies, always advocating me to get to it on the full and hit it hard straight back as hard as I could at him. "Quick feet Kendrick, get it on the full. Take a big first step. Come at me...", he would say.

This particular season we played off in an Under 14 Grand Final. I carried my bat for 65 and we won eight down. I was able to attack Mentone's star spinner of the day. Val's coaching was crucial to my success. Now with the kids at Kingston where I captain the thirds, I encourage, teach, and mentor just like Val. Not only was he a magnificent club cricketer who was good enough to represent Victoria five times – he was a caring, loving gentleman of the game.

His passing in January, aged 87, ended an era for many of us who have known and loved him. His funeral was a celebration of his life with noted cricket people in attendance in every corner of the Chapel.

In 27 seasons of senior club cricket, including 10 at District First XI level, Val amassed more than 13,000 runs at an average bordering on 50. His subbies average was almost 60. A product of Hailebury College and Melbourne Grammar, Val played in a District Final at the MCG before starting the next season in the third XI after Melbourne recruited Jack Iverson and John Cooper from Brighton. Years later Val told me "The Brighton recruits turned out to be pretty handy....they would have walked into any side, particularly Iverson. I came down in the final week before the 1948-49 season. The selectors had already picked their first two XIs, so I played in the thirds against Carlton at Ransford Oval. I went from the MCG to Royal Park in six months!"

He joined Prahran where he played in the club's famous 1954 – 55 premiership team under the no-nonsense, passionate leadership of Bradman Invincible Sam Loxton. The year before he'd amassed 669 runs with three centuries.

Just married, the opportunity to supplement a modest working wage with some cricketing monies triggered a shift to Malvern (3545 runs at 68) and then on to Oakleigh (5371 runs at 53). In all he made 19 centuries which is still a Subbies record.

Last summer he was elevated to the status of a 'Legend' of the VSDCA, whilst last May he attended the annual Hatch Presentation Dinner to present Sean Ayres with the Val Holten Medal which is named in his honour.

Val. was a giant of subbies cricket and a person loved and admired by all who came in contact with him. I was one of the lucky ones.

THE ACS'S CELEBRATION LUNCHEON WITH THE SOUTHERN STARS - FRIDAY, 21 NOVEMBER, 2014.

here was an excellent gathering of Society members and friends present in the dining room of the Kooyong Lawn Tennis Club on Friday, 21 November last year to hear three of the members of the Southern Stars Australian Women's Team speak about their experiences playing cricket and representing their country at the highest level. Representing the team at our function was Meg Lanning, the captain and two of her Victorian colleagues in the team, Kristen Beams and Julie Hunter.

The Society's President, Ken. Piesse, was also pleased to welcome to the function Mr. Geoff Tamblyn, the Chairman of Cricket Victoria. Geoff spoke warmly about the place of women's cricket in the overall scheme of the game in this country. He told us that the Victorian Women's Cricket Association (VWCA) and Cricket Victoria (CV) had amalgamated early in the 2000's. He said that wherever was possible it was Cricket Australia's policy to schedule women's representative matches before play in men's matches in order to maximize crowd attendance at that particular venue. He reminded us that the Commonwealth Bank were enthusiastic sponsors and supporters of the Southern Stars cricket team just as they were major sponsors of the Australian men's teams.

Kristen Beams

Kristen Beams, who originally came from the Sandy Bay Club in Hobart, Tasmania spoke first. She told us that she was a leg spin bowler who had been fortunate enough to have benefitted from lengthy spells of coaching from Terry Jenner, the guru of spin bowling who had been of so much help to Shane Warne. She told us that she was looking forward eagerly to the Southern

Stars next tour of England in July when the Ashes would once more be up for grabs.

Julie Hunter

Julie Hunter was one of the more experienced members of the Southern Stars playing squad. She is an all-rounder, but more a bowler who batted down the order. She bowls seam-up fast-medium paced leg cutters and inswingers. She had played in the three most recent Australian World Cup T20 encounters, including the Southern Stars' most recent triumph in Bangladesh where once again the Australian team had won the trophy.

At this point the audience was treated to a short video clip of the Southern Stars in action in the World Cup Final against England in Bangladesh earlier last year. From this clip it was obvious that the Australian girls were certainly fine players who were well led by their captain Meg. Lanning.

Meg Lanning

The President, Ken Piesse introduced Meg Lanning to the gathering. He reminded his audience that at the time of her appointment to the captaincy of the Australian women's team last year aged 22 she was the youngest person, male or female, to be appointed to such a responsible position of leadership in any sport in the world.

Meg began by saying what a privilege it was to lead such a fantastic group of players as the Southern Stars. She told us that she was always mindful of the importance of raising the profile of women's cricket, and by winning in the convincing style which the Australians were, she was confident that her team was doing just that.

Looking back, Meg was thankful for the excellent grounding which she received

when from Year 9 at Carey Grammar School she was selected to play with the boys in the School's First XI. Meg said that she too was looking forward very much to spearheading the Southern Stars' winter tour of England in the middle of 2015, as the rivalry between the Australian girls and their English counterparts was just as keen as that of the men. She told us that to win the Ashes in England next winter would most certainly put the icing on the cake.

The Australian Test team to play India in the First Test match had just been announced prior to the Society's function on November 21st. Meg was asked what she thought of the selected team. With a forthrightness typical of young people these days Meg fearlessly stated her opinion. She would have sacked Shane Watson and Nathan Lyon and gone for an all-out pace attack of four fast bowlers. She expressed great confidence in Mitchell Johnson, who she said was one of Australia's great pace bowlers. She had a lot of time for Steve Smith and confidently predicted that he would be Australia's next Test captain. This was well before Michael Clark injured himself and Steve Smith took over as standin Test captain.

In concluding proceedings our President, Ken Piesse thanked all three girls for coming along and speaking so freely of their experiences and aspirations for the future of women's cricket. He made them honourary members of the Australian Cricket Society, and presented copies of the Society's annual magazine "Pavilion" which had just been published to each of them. All those present agreed that it had been most worthwhile that the ACS had shown its interest in and support for women's cricket by sponsoring this most successful function.

THE AUSTRALIAN CRICKET SOCIETY'S CHRISTMAS DINNER WITH RAVI SHASTRI - SATURDAY, 27 DECEMBER, 2014.

ne of the dining areas at the Kooyong Lawn Tennis Club in Glenferrie Road, Kooyong was crowded with members and friends of the Australian Cricket Society, many of whom had come straight from the MCG after play on Day 2 of the Boxing Day Test Match against India to hear a talk from our guest of honour for the night, Ravi Shastri, the great Indian all-rounder. He had been able to join us at fairly short notice for our Christmas function. Unfortunately, our advertised speaker, the well known and much loved Indian cricket commentator Harsha Bhogle had been called home to Mumbai at short notice and was unable to be part of our function. We were most fortunate that Ravi Shastri, the Director of the touring Indian cricket team, had been able to join us at the last minute.

Firstly, our President Ken Piesse introduced Ravi Shastri to us and in doing so, paid a fulsome tribute to the giant contribution that our guest of honour had made and was still making to the development of cricket in India. The first time that Australian audiences became aware of Ravi Shastri the cricketer had been during the World Championship of Cricket Tournament which took place here in Australia in 1984-85. Shastri was fittingly awarded the Player of the Tournament trophy on account of the dominant role which he displayed in India's successful campaign. Shastri had two highly successful Test tours down under during 1985-86 and again in 1991-92, when he made a Test-best 206 in Sydney against an Australian attack which included debutant, Shane Warne.

Shastri averaged 77 in his nine Tests against the Australians and took 26 wickets at an average of 33 before retiring early with recurring knee problems.

Ravi's talk to the group took the form of a question and answer session during which our President, Ken Piesse asked the questions and our guest of honour volunteered his answers in a manner which demonstrated not only his command of the English language but also his twinkling sense of humour.

Ken Piesse: What are your recollections of that Sydney Test match when you made your highest score of 206?

Ravi Shastri: I recall that this Test match was Sachin Tendulkar's first Test match at the SCG. He was the youngest Indian

batsman to make a century against Australia. He was only 18 years of age at the time, and he most certainly let his bat do the talking against such fine Australian bowlers as McDermott, Reid and Hughes. That Test match in Sydney and the Tied Test match in Madras were undoubtedly the highlights of my career. My only regret is that in my day we did not play Australia as frequently as we do now, so I did not have the opportunities which young Indian players enjoy today to play cricket at the highest level.

KP: What do you recall about that triumphant moment when you won the Man of the Series prize for being the best player in the World Championship of Cricket Tournament in 1984-85?

Ravi: Well, I recall that the prize was a brand new car. Ian Chappell was about to present me with the keys to the car on the MCG after the last match when I turned around and found the whole Indian team clambering all over it laughing their heads off. After accepting the keys from Ian Chappell I jumped into the car and drove it around the MCG with the whole Indian team streaming along as best they could despite the fact that at the time I did not possess an international drivers licence at all.

KP: That knee injury which brought about a premature end to your playing career after 80 Test matches. Could you have played on if

that injury had occurred today, knowing the improvements in the way knee injuries are now handled?

Ravi: Yes, I probably could have played on after that injury if the methods and expertise which are available today had been available. But in my day the recovery time after serious knee surgery was a great deal longer than it is today. I have no regrets over my forced retirement from the game. After my playing career I have enjoyed a long and useful career in cricket administration and broadcasting. I am still fully occupied in pursuing my interests in cricket at the present time.

KP: Given your long and successful career in the media, what possessed you to take on your present task of Director of Cricket to the present Indian touring team?

Ravi: I was asked to take on the role of Director of Cricket until the end of the forthcoming World Cup, and I will do that. We'll see what happens at the end of the World Cup. I hope that

I'm still in the role when India becomes the

top cricket nation in all three forms of the game as I am confident that they will one day. The lads in the current Indian touring team have an average age of under 25. If we keep these lads together for long enough and give them enough experience in all three forms of the game they will get better for sure. Many of the other national cricket squads are going through and will go through periods of transition, including your present Australian squad where players like Haddin, Rogers, Clarke and Johnson are all nearing the end of their Test careers.

KP: For these young Indian players what is more important to them – a nice fat IPL contract and a starring role in a World Cup team or an assured place in the nation's Test cricket team?

Ravi: These young Indians are aiming


to gain proficiency in all three forms of the game, but rest assured a starring role in India's Test cricket team is what they value above all else.

KP: What is the future of the Direct Review System (DRS) and will India ever adopt it?

Ravi: The DRS should be taken away from the players and put in the hands of the umpires. At the moment India has serious doubts about the accuracy of the ball tracking device which is designed to track the progress of the ball once it hits any part of the batsman's body in front of the wicket. This is why we won't adopt it given the present state of the technology of this device.

KP: Ravi, you've mentioned the Tied Test match several times tonight. I've got an idea that you were at the non-striker's end when the last over of that dramatic match was being bowled when that Indian tailender was given out lbw to Greg Matthews' bowling. Take us through that last over will you?

Ravi: From the non-striker's end where I was it was as obvious as the nose on your face that the batsman got a huge inside edge on that ball. Allan Border didn't even appeal because he was aware of what had happened. The umpire went up with the bowler on appeal giving the batsman out Ibw as quick as a flash. Had the DRS been in operation at that time it is certain that that decision would have been negated. When

I accosted the umpire in his room after the match had ended he laughed in my face and declared "I'll go down in history as being the umpire who was brave enough to give the batsman out in the most pressurized situation possible in Test cricket." There was nothing else I could do. The decision had been made. The match was over and the result has gone down in history. But it was a very poor decision. Despite all of that, the Tied Test match in Madras was one of the greatest Test matches in history. When play began on the final day there were about 5,000 spectators in the ground and there was very little premonition about what was about to happen. By the end of play there were about 50.000 screaming fans in the ground. Pandemonium broke out at the final decision. I will never forget it as long as I live. **KP:** Finally, Ravi, we had Henry Blofeld as our guest of honour at our Christmas function last year. You must have worked with him at some stage in the media. What are your recollections of "Blowers" over the years you've known him?

Ravi: Well Ken, one of the funniest moments I've ever experienced occurred whilst I was in the commentary box with "Blowers". It happened whilst I was on Test Match Special in the commentary box during a Test match at the Oval. "Blowers" came on for his stint of commentating. He began in his inimitable plummy voice: "There goes CMJ (Christopher Martin-Jenkins). Ravi Shastri joins me in the box. Bus number 47 has just gone past me and, blow me down, two pregnant nuns have just joined the crowd below me here at the Oval!" Shastri, in a tone of shocked incredulity jumped up and peered out of the commentary

box window. "Can I see these pregnant nuns. Where are they?" To which Blofeld in his most lordly manner replied: "Sit down Ravi. This is radio not television. I can say what I like on this medium. I'm here to paint a picture for the listeners. Just relax!"

There was much else besides, but the above gives the reader some idea of the fun we all experienced when the great Indian cricketer Ravi Shastri entertained the Society last Christmas.

In thanking our guest who had to hurry away before his audience had even been served their main course, our President remarked that after what we had heard that evening many of us would nominate India as our second team in the forthcoming World Cup. Our applause was warm and heartfelt as we waved our Indian guest farewell.


A New Gold Sponsor

Our ACS Bookstall at the Sydney Cricket Ground During the Fourth Test Match Against India.




Ken Piesse and Peter Lloyd at the SCG bookstall


